Annual General Meeting



Meet The FoCHers

For some time now we had been aware that native fauna was returning to Cornish Hill. Residents had reported seeing blue tongued lizards and echidnas. We discovered evidence of wombats and we were always having issues with wallabies eating newly planted trees. We also knew we had a resident copperhead snake not to mention all the frogs and the 40 different species of small insects discovered and photographed by John Caldow during a school program last year. Seeds of Learning about living more responsibly with our wildlife neighbours had already been sown - hence the Meet The FoCHers event on Saturday 13 October in the Reserve. With 300 invitations to deliver to surrounding houses, it was crucial that we got them into envelopes ready to be delivered to letterboxes in plenty of time. Thank you to Bill, Liz, Barbara, Helen and Jan for delivering the invitations, and to Anne and my friend Val for all the enveloping and to Lucy for creating the flyer. Sunny weather was ordered, and all costs were covered by Landcare Victoria. With interesting guest speakers such as Janine Trickey from

The icing on the cake was having Gayle Osborne from Wombat Forestcare speak to us about the Victorian Environmental Assessment Council. VEAC is the organisation which provides independent and strategic advice about areas of Wombat Forest to the State Government, at the request of the minister for Energy, Environment and Climate Change, the Hon. Lily D'Ambrosio MP. You may have noticed SAY NO TO VEAC signs along main roads, along with signs stating LOVE WOMBAT FOREST LET'S PROTECT IT FOREVER. Changes to the forest's status are contentious and the publicity has excited many people, both positively and negatively. As *Friends of Cornish Hill* is a Landcare group, we aim to protect our forests from overlogging and mining and advocate that threatened species of plants, animals, birds and fungi also be protected. Schools Programs

School Term 4 started with a bang. From 25 October right through to 22 November, we will be holding five different school events. Welcome Daylesford Secondary College students *Gettin' Dirty* and *Hands On Learning*, the Dharma School and Wesley College Year 9 students. Whilst the Daylesford and Wesley students were involved in planting, the Dharma students installed their very cute hand-made frog signs along the creek. We had 500 grasses to plant so needed to be well organised. Most of the preparation was completed during the weekend and weekday working bees without which we would not have been able to host these school events. Another massive thanks to Jan, Steve, Andrew, Ivon, Liz, Judy, Leeanne, Jane and Alex for all the people power. And just to finish off, all that activity with school students equates to 262 student hours on the Hill. Wow! Now that is impressive. We are grateful to Landcare Victoria for funding us and enabling us to host the plantings and school events.

Gorse Task Force

Heidi, from Gorse Task Force paid us a visit too. Her task was to map the gorse on Cornish Hill. Gorse is listed as a weed of national significance and we sure have a significant amount growing on the Hill. Much of the hard work we do in weed eradication is compromised by the large infestations growing on the higher ground. It is a constant battle keeping on top of both gorse and broom as well, not to mention blackberries alongside other woody weeds growing.

Wildflowers on Cornish Hill

It's been a great year for wildflowers, and we've had our share on the Hill. Thanks to Roger Thomas and Frances Cincotta for identifying the Small-leaf Parrot-pea, (Dillwynia phylicoides). Whilst it may commonly grow elsewhere in Hepburn Shire, this little plant is the last one remaining on Cornish Hill. So much has been lost from the Hill, either ravaged by the mining or buried in woody weeds. Much has gone into restoring the landscape. Could this sturdy, strong, and resilient plant be a defiant symbol of that era? In 2019, track improvements are planned as part of fire management in the Reserve, so the Small-leaf Parrot-peas and the few remaining Correa reflexa and Acacia aculeatissima plants need to be protected.
